PASTORAL LETTER

Yesterday I was in the garden to cut back a hedge and other shrubs. Unfortunately, I disturbed a bee's nest in a clump of ferns. They did seem to recover, here is hoping. The theme for the garden is wildlife so I'm kind of chuffed that bees have made a home in the garden. I plant wild flowers and other plants that are attractive to bees, so they now have both food and shelter in the garden - I'm pleased.

From the General Assembly and over the past weeks on a Sunday morning the theme is growth. I've been drawing from a book by Dr. John Pentland of Hillhurst United Church in Canada: *"Fishing Tips: How curiosity transformed a community of faith."*

What is clear when it comes to church is that belonging matters. Belonging creates a strength of attachment with each other and with place. It comes from sharing something of our lives together with the common ground being the way of Jesus. People can find belonging to church difficult because they have perceptions that churches are about having to conform. Churches can seem strange places and people can also get out of the way of belonging when life seems to get in the way.

One of the things, among quite a few, that we've taken from John Pentland's book is circles of engagement. People engage with church in different ways. There are people who engage with activities during the week like Making Dundee Home or Badminton, others who work or volunteer in the cafe and then there is the Guild, Girl's Brigade and Brownies. In some ways there has been growth of engagement, but not really on a Sunday morning. Yet, Sunday morning is our focus on the way of Jesus, it's the time that keeps us anchored in the way of giving, the way of forgiving, the way of life itself. All the activities arise because the way of Jesus, the way of life, is what we are about. I'll be exploring how we might build connections between the way of life and our circles of engagement.

THE CHRISTIAN AND HIS MONEY

The New Testament is clear about the dangers of money which, in its pursuit, may take the place of the worship of God.

In his book, 'Ethics in a Permissive Society', Dr William Barclay writes at some considerable length on Christian views of money.

The parable of the rich man and Lazarus (Luke 16, 19-31) tells us of Jesus' attitude to wealth. The picture painted almost fills one with a feeling of personal nausea and disgust: the one, rich beyond belief, enjoyed the best the world can provide, the other a beggar suffering from ulcerated sores, so helpless he was unable to control the dogs which plagued him as he sat by the rich man's gate – relying, as Barclay puts it, on the crumbs from the master's table.

The scene changes in the life to come and the roles are reversed: Lazarus who, to many in life was but part of the daily landscape, enjoys eternal life.

The second – better-known – parable involves the rich young ruler who asks Jesus how he may inherit an eternal existence following death on earth. When instructed to divest himself of his total wealth and redistribute it to the poor, he departs, sad at heart. Had he not led an exemplary life all his days? Again, Barclay suggests it was the young man's attachment to his possessions that was at fault.

Each of us, during our working life and beyond in retirement has paid his taxes and may have given generously to private charitable causes at home and abroad. Compared with some, our financial resources are considerable, and there remain so many children who lack the basics we enjoy – a bed we can sleep in at night, having benefited from drinking clean water and having had at least one nourishing meal during the hours of day.

In Dundee West, our building is well looked after; much is being done in the community for those in need; and the recent improvement in offerings should be recognised: all praiseworthy projects. But, in conclusion, I quote Barclay's closing words regarding the Christian and his money:

'Nevertheless, it must be said that there is need beyond impersonal giving.'

It was said of a man who was generous with money but who stopped there. With all his giving, he never gave himself. And there are times when the giving of oneself is the greatest gift of all – for that is the gift that Jesus gave to us.


CONNECTION

On a recent short break in Morayshire I visited Brodie Castle. It was one of the hottest spells of the summer, and the castle and grounds were seen to their best advantage that day.

Imagine my surprise to find a connection with not only Dundee but with our parish and one of the most celebrated names in the 20th century art world and this city - James McIntosh Patrick. Also, the event recorded happened exactly 81 years to this month's *Grapevine*.

Amongst the many fine paintings in the castle there was one by McIntosh Patrick and it was accompanied by a letter from the artist, himself, to Major Ian Brodie dated 13 September 1938. It turns out that he was a guest of Major Brodie and his wife at the castle whilst he was undertaking a commission for them. He thanks his hosts for their kindness during his stay, remarks on the kind weather - just as I found it - and hopes that Mrs Brodie has recovered from her cold. All very every day correspondence but just a little snippet from a day in the life McIntosh Patrick.

Having been born and brought up in the street round the corner from his Magdalen Yard Road home, like many others in the church from the West End, it is almost like finding out something about one of your own family. Interestingly, however, he was not living in that house at the time but at 291 Blackness Road.
