PASTORAL LETTER

Sometimes we might wonder what is the point?

What is the point of trying to make a positive difference for fairness when this world is very unfair? Jesus said in a parable that the world gives to those who already have much and takes from those who have nothing.

What is the point in recycling or even campaigning for action on climate change when it all seems too late? The Amazon continues to burn and there is increasing loss of ice in Greenland, the Arctic and the Antarctic!

Just why do we bother?

In the autumn of 1718 Benjamin and Sarah Lay arrived in the Caribbean. They were Quakers and hoped to be among friends in that new country. The Lays were also hunchbacks and barely four feet tall. One day when Sarah was visiting a fellow Quaker she was shocked to find a naked African suspended outside the main house after being savagely whipped for being a runaway. Sarah Lay was horrified, but her fellow Quaker felt no need to apologise. Industry needed workers to work in the heat who would not die from tropical diseases. Moreover, if Industry was to be competitive then it needed slave labour to maintain very, very low costs and maximise profits. No Christian should feel guilty about this - it was even justified by the Bible, but the Lays did feel guilty AND they wanted to do something about it!

For the rest of their lives the Lays campaigned to end Slavery and took their campaign to Philadelphia to where they had moved. After his wife died in 1735 Benjamin Lay increased his provocation of the establishment in never stinting to call his fellow Christians the biggest hypocrites. It took to 1759, when Benjamin himself was on his deathbed, for the Quaker community of Philadelphia to discipline any Quaker who traded in slaves. It took a further 60 years before swathes of British citizens regarded slavery as a monstrous sin and both Britain and France joined in campaigning for its end.

If we limit ourselves to our limitations we will do nothing, but the Spirit has no limitations.

THE GUILD

The new session of the Guild started off literally with all bells ringing! We were entertained by a group of handbell ringers from the Blairgowrie area and what a happy evening it was. Two of the group had taken ill just days before and could not attend, but their friends carried on brilliantly, some even coping with two sets of bells at once. They had a very varied programme and we enjoyed it very much indeed.

On 8 October Ron Srimgeour returned to the Guild, this time telling us about the history of the tomb in Westminster Abbey dedicated to the Unknown Warrior. Ron is a retired history teacher and knows his subjects so well that he speaks without a note! The subject was quite moving but at the same time quite fascinating. From the idea of David Railston, a forces chaplain, who understood the anguish of families who had lost loved ones but were forced to accept that they had been buried where they fell and there could be no funeral at which the family members could express their grief and remember their lives; through all the red tape, to the final burial of an unknown warrior (no one knew the name, regiment, rank) in a grave in the Abbey which had been filled with French soil taken from the battlefield.

Marjorie Clark from the World Mission came along on 22 October and told us of the work being done through one of the Guild National Projects to help young mothers in Zambia. It is absolutely crucial and, although still at an early stage, is already giving groups of young girls advice on a range of topics such as health, sex education, nutrition, child care, education and training for work skills.

If you have ever been the victim of a scam, our next talk is the one to help you - How to Avoid Scams. It should be very enlightening and informative. This is on 5 November at 7.30 p.m. Remember our meetings are open to everyone, so do come along.

The Guild Quiz held on 10 September (it seems so far away now) was a fun night and one we might repeat at some time in the future. £230 was raised which will go towards supporting the Guild Projects.

Our next fund-raiser and social event is the Autumn Coffee Morning which will be held on Saturday, 9 November. We will have all the usual stalls for gifts, books, cake and candy, raffle and tombola - and, of course, lots of hot tea or coffee and some edible treats. Do come along and support this event. SITUATION ETHICS

DR. WILLIAM BARCLAY

When we talk about ethics, we mean a series of rules, laws and principles by which we act, telling us as Christians, how we should act in certain situations. Normally we classify such situations as either good or bad.

However, in the 1960's an American professor, Joseph Fletcher, introduced a new concept which he called, "Situation Ethics", in which he stated that in a study of ethics there is nothing which is intrinsically good or intrinsically bad.

Barclay suggests that for the Christian in dealing with such a situation the word "love," must be the key consideration. He uses the Greek word, "agape" the highest form of love which omits the physical and passionate aspects and which recognises the good in another regardless of the hurt that may result.

Here are a couple of examples: Suppose for instance a house catches fire. Within there is a young child and an original painting worth a king's ransom. Which do you save? The answer is obvious. A life is of greater value than a painting.

But consider the situation of the burning house in which live an aged father, whose days are numbered and a brilliant young doctor who has discovered a cure, the formula for which is still to be penned and which will save many thousands still to be born.

Which should be saved?

IN THE NEWS

Did anyone notice a few weeks ago in the Craigie Column on the same day two articles in *The Courier and Advertiser* that had connections with Dundee West Church?

The first related to this year's Act of Remembrance Service which will be led by Rev. Gordon Campbell. Many in the church will remember Gordon who came through Sunday School to becoming a member of the then Roseangle Ryehill Church, and then going on in time to train as an auxiliary minister of the Church of Scotland.

Gordon is a very active person with many strings to his bow. He was very involved in the Scout movement becoming an Area Commissioner. He is an excellent speaker and is often called upon to talk to groups about a wide range of topics, and in addition he is Secretary of Tayforth Universities Military Education Committee, as well as Honorary University Chaplain. His day time job is Financial Manager at Dundee University and outwith that he is part-time minister at Perth Congregational Church.

This is a very well deserved honour for Gordon to be invited to lead the Remembrance Service.

The second article was about William Lyon Mackenzie, well known in Dundee West through the stain glass window in the Friendship Hall and through an article in a *Grapevine* some time ago.

Donald Abbott of Invergowrie is a regular contributor to *The Courier* on topics of local history and has mentioned in the past other points of interest from Dundee West history (and the original five churches which now make up our one joint congregation). In this article Donald Abbott brings to the attention a plaque which shoppers can see at the Overgate Centre which commemorates Mackenzie. He goes on to say that Mackenzie was thought to have been involved in his formative years with the radicals of his native town and was a friend of Robert Rintoul, the editor of *The Dundee Advertiser*. He went on to emigrate to Canada and set sail from Dundee in April 1820 on a journey of 28 days to reach Quebec.

As we know from the plaque in our own church he later became the first mayor of Toronto. This was when Canada was just a relatively small area of North America and not the country we know now.

UPDATE

Progressive Christianity Network meetings began again on the 28th October at 7.30pm for 2019/2020. There were three new participants for a discussion among the eight of us on our personal understandings and experience of faith. It was a deep conversation that expanded our understanding of each other and not just faith, which is helpful in building bonds.

Future meetings for 2019/2020 will be the last Monday of each month at 7.30pm up to the end of May, but no meeting in December. Planned subjects to date are as follows: -

25th November - Quantum Physics & God (DVD with Rev. Dr. Robin Meyers.)

27th January - The practice of spirituality (discussion)

24th February - Prayer and well-being (discussion)

30th March - Peace through Justice, not Peace through Victory (discussion)

Making Dundee Home continues every Wednesday and Friday with *drop ins* providing lunch, food collections, clothes and household items as they are available. Wednesdays are only promoted through word of mouth and comprise food from Greggs for lunch along with creative activity. In particular, Claire of Just Bee Productions is leading a group in the preparation of a drama production on recovering from mental ill health. This will be performed in Dundee West later in 2020. We usually have around 30 visitors with an increasing number of women.

Fridays continue to provide a three course lunch usually led by Alison Cruickshank in the kitchen. Numbers are between 45 - 55 for lunch and again there is other food, clothes and household items. There is also the opportunity to be creative and some visitors spend time creating art of various kinds. We will be open on Christmas Day again this year as it was very obvious that for some folks Christmas was a lonely time and could be depressing.

We have nursing staff from the NHS Keep Well team attend on both Wednesdays and Fridays. They can be a godsend when listening to people and provide guidance on both physical and mental health issues.

We often have staff from the housing charity Shelter and are encouraging interest from the local authority team working on substance misuse.

People who attend are most often on benefits over the long term and may have other issues related to ill health or addictions. As mentioned there are more women, with a couple of older men who are isolated after losing their wives. There are increasing demands on supporting individuals to engage with other agencies and attend benefit assessments. We will be assisting a few folks to update their CVs to move towards employment as employment agencies provide less support due to local changes.

This sort of activity is replicated across the city by many churches in response to increasing poverty, substance misuse and poor mental health.

Our Dance for Parkinson's class continues with two new dancers having been expertly training in both Leeds and London through our Go for It funding.

Sadly, we have just lost one of our number who died suddenly towards the end of October. Community Dance remains a priority and I'm open to anyone who might want to assist in this initiative to improve exercise and help address isolation and loneliness, especially among those who are older.

Soul-Space+

I will be re-starting Soul Space as there is interest from some of the participants and volunteers in Making Dundee Home and others. It will comprise meditation and conversation as a way of enabling personal development, resilience and commitment to positive action. I'm just not sure what the best time for this is, but it will be open to everyone.

2020: -

As at the time of providing this update we remain in vacancy but cannot remain static. The Church of Scotland has a programme of radical change that aims for growth. Having a strategy for growth is crucial, irrespective of us being in vacancy. The Mission and Worship group is meeting on the evening of the 12th November when the development of such a strategy must be initiated for the Kirk Session and Church. It's soon to be a NEW YEAR and a new decade that will definitely bring challenges as well as opportunities.
